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The History Center in Tompkins County Awarded \$4,710 from NYSCA and MANY Partnership Grants for Capacity Building

[ITHACA NY]—The History Center in Tompkins County is extremely excited to announce that they have received \$4,710 in grant awards from the NYSCA & MANY Partnership Grants Across NYS for Capacity Building. The awarded funds will be used to upgrade technology used by staff, volunteers, and visiting researchers in our Research Library and Exhibit Hall.

The Museum Association of New York (MANY) in partnership with the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA) awarded a total of \$502,114 to 103 grantees to assist New York museums with capacity building.

"We thank NYSCA for this partnership and this opportunity to rapidly distribute much-needed funding to New York's museums," said **Erika Sanger, Executive Director, MANY.**

"The continued financial impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic have made it difficult to prioritize technology upgrades while we navigate other significant financial challenges. This grant partnership with NYSCA was developed in direct response to the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and Partners for Public Good (PPG) study "Market Analysis and Opportunity Assessment of Museum Capacity Building Programs" report published in March 2021.

Capacity Building grants were awarded in amounts up to and including \$5,000 to help museums respond to pandemic-related challenges, build financial stability, strengthen board

and community engagement, update technology, support leadership, and change systems to address diversity, equity, access, inclusion, and justice. Awards were made to museums of all budget sizes and disciplines.

The History Center will use the awarded funds to replace two staff laptops, two laptops in our Research Library used by visiting researchers and volunteers, and a laptop for our volunteer docents at the front desk of our Exhibit Hall. The new staff computers will replace models from 2014 and 2016 respectively, while the current Research Library laptops and the front desk laptops both pre-date the Obama administration's first term in office. The funds to replace these computers will directly enable all parts of our local history community to be active stewards of our collections, create engaging public exhibits and digital content, and support the needs of on-site and remote researchers.

"The arts and culture sector is facing a multi-year recovery process after two years of unimaginable challenges," said **Mara Manus, Executive Director, NYSCA**. "We are grateful to MANY for their stewardship of this opportunity that will ensure New York State museums continue to grow and thrive. We send our congratulations to all grantees on their awards."
