Samantha Nivison, Emma Corinne Brown Galvin, women's history Then & Now 3/13/15

Article discusses two prominent women: Samantha Nivison of Dryden and Emma Corinne Brown Galvin, originally of Virginia, and later Ithaca. Both were pioneers in the community. Nivison was one of the first women doctors in Tompkins County, and responsible for opening Dryden Springs House, a water cure sanitarium. Galvin was one of the first African American women to receive a PhD from Cornell. She later went on to teach at Ithaca College among her many other accomplishments.

Column describes the Civil War efforts of women's groups in Tompkins County. Women prepared food and sewed useful items, which they sent to soldiers. This aid, in addition to fundraising, was undertaken in such communities as Ithaca, Dryden, Groton, Danby, Mecklenburg, Peruville, Enfield, West Danby, Lansingville, and Newfield. Organizations included the Groton Methodist Society and the Ithaca Ladies Volunteer Aid Association. Local women mentioned are Jane Hardy, Julia Cook, Mary Ann Cornell, Mrs. Vorhis, and Delia Allen.
