### Our exhibits this year...

The History Center welcomed over 5,000 visitors to our Exhibit Hall in 2022! History Center staff hosted over 50 events, and led more than 65 guided tours throughout the year in addition to curating five public exhibits. Our programs explored aspects of local history from Haudenosaunee crafts, to Rural Clock Maps, and speak-easies in downtown Ithaca. What was your favorite local history experience in 2022?



reCOUNT: Facing our Census was on display at The History Center in Tompkins County from April 1st-December 30th 2022. reCOUNT offered a new way to engage with the census. Instead of an overwhelming set of numbers and data aligned in tables and charts, the exhibit built human connections to the people behind the statistics. This unique census exhibit showcased the power and potential growth behind HistoryForge, The History Center's flagship digital interactive platform for understanding local history.

### HistoryForge - A Year of Discovery & Expansion

### In 2022 HistoryForge Volunteers...

- Transcribed the 1880 census for the City of Ithaca
- Determined the old [pre-1899] street numbers for many of <a href="Ithaca's buildings">Ithaca's buildings</a> and added them to our building records
  - Began transcribing the 1950 census in the City of Ithaca
    - Started expanding HistoryForge into rest of the county

## HistoryForge Tompkins: Taking history sleuthing to a whole new level!

One of our long-term goals, expanding <u>HistoryForge into the rest of Tompkins County</u>, has become a reality through our recent <u>NEH grant</u>.

Because house numbers were not adopted by most of the communities in the county until the late 1950s, in addition to transcribing census records, HistoryForge workers will need to determine the addresses of rural residents from those historic censuses in order to map them.

To determine how best to do this we started in the Town of Caroline (scroll map to view),

with the help of the members of the Caroline

<u>History Association</u>. The <u>1940</u> and <u>1950</u> censuses for the Town of Caroline have been transcribed and volunteers from the <u>Caroline History Association</u> are currently working on the 1920 census.

In addition to Caroline, transcription of the 1950 census has started for the towns of

## Research & Preservation Work in the Archives

2022 was an amazing year for our Archives and Research Library, with more than 700

resources, as well as extraordinary donations for the collections. We served people from more than 12 different states researching topics as varied as genealogy, local commercial history, flooding throughout the county, Haudenosaunee history and culture, the Underground Railroad, local transportation and social justice, and the



history of Ithaca City Cemetery, to name just a few.

### Research Projects

A high point of our year was the successful resumption of our intensive research initiative with Ithaca College students after a two-year hiatus due to Covid. Almost every year since 2005 we have conducted innovative research projects with <a href="Prof. Michael Smith and his History of American Environmental Thought">Prof. Michael Smith and his History of American Environmental Thought</a> classes. Students are taught how to be historians, and given in-depth introductions to our <a href="archival collections">archival collections</a> and guidance on best practices for researching. Focusing on various topics of local environmental significance such as energy use, water concerns, public health, agricultural history, and industrial development, students did research in our archival collections and then prepared a final project outlining their findings.

We also worked with a second Ithaca College class based on the same research model. This new group's focus was on local history, exploring the Ithaca community in a study of *Regenerate History*, that is, the kind of history that the community might draw upon to help it move forward into the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

We were delighted to be engaging with Ithaca College students again in this fun and fruitful research process and look forward to continuing this research collaboration in the coming years.

#### **Donations**

Dozens of donations to the archives included the history of <a href="Ithaca's Tang family">Ithaca's Tang family</a> and their storied restaurant Asiatic Garden; also a rich collection of correspondence from the <a href="Scott family of Lansing">Scott family of Lansing</a>. Our most significant donations this year were pieces from the <a href="Collection of artist George Rhoads">Collection of artist George Rhoads</a>, and materials from local environmentalists.

George Rhoads, painter and sculptor, was best known as the creator of numerous "audiokinetic" sculptures, or ball machines, whimsical moving sculptures that have become popular in science museums, airports, shopping malls, corporate headquarters, and hospitals around the world, including here at <a href="Ithaca's Sciencenter">Ithaca's Sciencenter</a>. Part art, part engineering marvels, these amusing and fascinating works have engaged millions. We are working with family members and colleagues of Rhoads to document his life and work, and we have so far received numerous archival materials including business records, photographs, paintings and other artwork, as well as the sculptor's plans for his creations. More is to come in the new year.

Thousands of activists worked hard to prevent hydrofracking in Tompkins County and



greater New York, and we have been working with local luminaries from this group to document their work. Several of them have donated archival collections, including reports, photographs, lawn signs, posters, correspondence and more highlighting the groups and individuals and their hard work in the lead up to New York State's ban of hydrofracking in 2014. We look forward to continuing our work with local "fracktivists" in the coming year.
