## reCOUNT: Facing Our Census

#### Opens April 1st 2022 - on display through March 2023

## Join us for <u>OPENING NIGHT 4/1 from 5-8pm</u> in tandem with Gallery Night in Downtown Ithaca!

reCOUNT: Facing our Census draws on the extensive work done by The History Center's HistoryForge (historyforge.net) project and its many volunteers. Over the last six years, The History Center has developed an open-source digital web environment, HistoryForge, that integrates historic maps, building records, and local census data. HistoryForge allows users to connect more deeply to their neighborhoods, and understand the historical legacies present in our everyday lives.

Using themes such as education, family origins, employment, race, and census taking, <u>reCOUNT</u> expands Tompkins County history through six interactive exhibits. Beginning with the first U.S. Census in 1790, the exhibits will trace the development of the county and the census across 23 decades. <u>reCOUNT</u> will inform our understanding of Tompkins County, and position audiences to think critically about local history's impact on our lives.


Visit us from April 2022-March 2023 to explore the following exhibits in person:

### Use HistoryForge.net to Explore Ithaca's Neighborhoods

HistoryForge is an innovative digital history project combining maps, archival records, and census data that allows any community to explore its local history through the individuals who lived there and the buildings and neighborhoods they lived in.


Our pilot project began in 2016 and focuses on exploring the history of Ithaca, New York in the late 19th and early 20th century <u>using interactive search functions</u> which allow users to find information on historic maps about people and places.

<u>Ithaca HistoryForge</u> includes over 70,000 digitized census records of Ithacan's from 1910-1940, and is in the process of adding tens of thousands of building records to the database.

By searching the database **using the "Race" filter** on different census years you can see where Black neighborhoods existed in the City of Ithaca.



Each red dot references a selfidentified Black individual or family living in the building in the 1930 census. The area shown is the Southside Neighborhood. You can see the names, ages, professions and more of each individual by exploring their census records.



We have just begun work on transcribing the records for the Town of Caroline (explore the 1937 Tompkins County Development Map recently added) and look forward to continuing to expand Tompkins County records on <u>HistoryForge</u>!

#### Ithaca's Lost Connection to It's Ukrainian Sister City of Komsomolsk

"Ithaca's support for the Ukrainian plight seems clear now, but little has been told about Ithaca's deeper connection with Ukraine, in the days when the country was emerging after the collapse of the Soviet Union.

That relationship appears to have peaked in the 1990s under then-Mayor Alan Cohen, who started and maintained a relationship with Komsomolsk, Ukraine, that extended over several years during his administration from 1996–2002 and included seven in-person trips. Cohen's trips to the city, a lakeside municipality which had a population of

about 55,000 at the time and is now known as Horishni Plavni, would last about two weeks at a time and were packed with activity.
