2019 - Communes of Tompkins County - Oral History Project

'Communes of Tompkins County' contains three interviews (as of 2022) conducted by Rod Howe, former director of The History Center, interviewing Tompkins County community members who lived in intentional communities in Tompkins County in the latter half of the twentieth century. The communes discussed in this collection include Lavender Hill, Yea God, and Be Light as of 2023.

This oral history collection may increase as interviews with other community members with commune experiences are added to the Oral Histories of Tompkins County collections.

Mitch Bobrow (Yea God) (49 minutes)

Mitch Bobrow explains the formation of the Yea God commune, including its origins and settlement in the Ithaca area. Bobrow discusses the living situation of the community and addresses challenges faced, including the dissolution of the commune. In this interview, Bobrow gives his opinions on the workings of the commune and his own experience as a core member.

David Hirsch and Yvonne Fisher discuss Newfield/West Danby Lavender Hill commune, which was centered around the feminist movement and queer community. They shed light on the commune's migration to Tompkins and challenges faced at the individual and community level. Hirsch and Fisher reflect on their experience living there and delve into different events and movements that developed that community.
