'High School Students Discuss COVID-19' contains 11 self-recorded monologues from Tompkins County teenagers from the earliest months of the COVID-19 pandemic in Tompkins County. These short narratives give personal insight into the dramatic shifts that area youth experienced as school and social lives upended in a few short weeks in early months of 2020. Recordings were originally collected by JT Stone, a freelance journalist and recent Ithaca High School graduate for an article published on the Ithaca Voice in September 2020.
